Welcome



A very warm welcome to our concert this evening. Last time we sang in St. Mary's we had a packed house. The occasion was the première of our Musical Director, Michael Cayton's composition, *Missa Beati Virginis Mariae*, written to celebrate the Choir's 50th Anniversary. It is gratifying to see this lovely *Missa Brevis* being taken up by other choirs; Wyomndham Choral Society is performing it this summer in Wyomndham Abbey, the venue for one of our concerts during our tour of East Anglia in 2016.

Tonight, as well as extracts from the *Missa*, we bring you a selection of anthems, beloved by music fans of all genres. Byrd's *Ave Verum* and Franck's *Panis Angelicus* have been firm favourites for generations. Much of our programme is from the book of European Sacred Music, edited by our own home-grown John Rutter and published by Oxford Choral Classics. The Choir purchased this anthology from a bequest by one of our former long-standing members, Tim Goodwin. We are indebted to Tim; his gift will enable the Choir to perform favourite pieces for years to come, without the need to look elsewhere for the scores. Extensive use will be made of it again in Vienna and Slovakia in about a month's time; exciting destinations for a series of concerts the Choir is performing over a long weekend in May.

For our summer concert we will be back at Sarratt Village Hall. Last year was a glitzy *Golden Night at the Movies*. This year it's *Opera Choruses*. Come and enjoy Puccini's *Humming Chorus*, Bizet's *Habanera*, *Easter Hymn* from *Cavaleria Rusticana* and other classics from this captivating genre. Tickets can be bought from Choir members, Chorleywood Bookshop, through our website www.chilternchoir.org.uk or at the door, subject to availability. Last year was a sell out, three weeks before the concert!!

Programme notes:

It is not surprising that singing plays such an important role in any religious practice. The very act of singing; of beautifying one's own nature is in some way to connect with God.

In Western Christian culture the first examples of sacred singing was in the medieval period with the singing of a single line sung by monks or nuns to beautify and illuminate the text. There are particularly beautiful examples of this from the writings of the mystic abbess, Hildegard Von Bingham who was once described as a "feather on the breath of God". Over the centuries the single lines began to become more interesting and more ornate. Cadences could be used to punctuate the text with the plagal cadence (IV – I) becoming the traditional sequence used for the *Amen*.

As printing technology improved there was a desire for more written music and the Renaissance era brought with it an explosion of sound in polyphony. Now for the first time we are not restricted to 2 or possibly 3 voices at a time, composers such as Thomas Tallis, Palestrina and William Byrd were to compose in multiple voices most notable Tallis' *Spem in Alium* written for 40 voices. But the Renaissance also brought with it an understanding throughout Europe of what constituted consonance (i.e. a sound that is pleasing to the ear) and what constituted a dissonance (i.e. a sound creating tension and discomfort) and how to use these different sounds to beautify text. During the concert, listen for Tallis' *O Nata Lux* and the use of sour dissonances at the end of the piece.

The Renaissance led the way for later composers to build and develop on those ideas. J.S. Bach and Pachelbel between them set many sacred melodies into chorales between them developing what can be considered the most perfect use of harmony. Indeed, even to this day, Bach's setting of the 371 chorales is still considered to be the rule book for harmony.

Following the excesses of the Baroque era, the Classical era brought a new age of simplicity to sacred music and tonight we hear a beautiful example of this in Mozart's *Ave Verum Corpus*. As we move into the Romantic and Modern eras we hear the music of Brahms, Bruckner and Mendelssohn (listen out for the double canon in Brahms' *Geistliches Lied* and the most heavenly *Amen* of all). And for the first time we link between East and West with the Rachmaninov *Bogoroditsye Dyevo*.

Recent improvements in technology have heralded advancements in all areas of music but particularly in Sacred Music. Music notation software has enabled composers to publish their work to a wider audience than was ever possible before. The Western church is currently enjoying a second Renaissance despite society being more of a secular nature. Church music has never been so popular

particularly with the music of John Rutter, Jonathan Dove and Bob Chilcott (to name but a few). New music is being commissioned and composed all the time but it all shares something in common with the very earliest Gregorian chant, the fact that it is ultimately written to the glory of God.

Performing today:

Michael Cayton, Conductor

Conductor Michael Cayton has been Director Music at the Chiltern Choir, one of Hertfordshire's finest choral societies, since 2003 and is midway through his 15th season. During his time with the choir he has conducted performances of repertoire from Bach to Maxwell-Davies, Purcell to Eric Whitacre. Recent performances have included a joint concert with Watford Philharmonic of Karl Jenkins' *The Armed Man* and a stunning performance of Monteverdi's *Vespers*.



Michael has also been Musical Director of Watford Philharmonic Society since 2014 following his debut in an exhilarating performance of Britten's *War Requiem*. Since then he has led both choir and orchestra in a wide variety of works, such as Karl Jenkins' *Armed Man*, Britten's *Sea Interludes*, Bliss *Morning Heroes*, Bach's *B Minor Mass* and Beethoven's infamous *Ninth Symphony*. Meanwhile, the orchestra having completed a full cycle of workshops on Beethoven's Symphonies is now well into a new series on the symphonies of Franz Schubert with the most recent workshop, earlier this month, on the *Fourth Symphony*.

Forthcoming conducting engagements this year include Mozart's *Symphony No 17* and *Krönungsmesse* with Brandenburg Sinfonia and the Medici Choir at St. Martin in the Fields on the 2nd April.

Michael has also been the Director of Music at St John's Wood Church in London since 2003, where he conducts both the critically acclaimed professional choir and the successful community Chamber Choir.

Having attended the Royal College of Music, where he studied piano, organ, and conducting, Michael won the Hilda Deane Anderson prize for conducting and improvisation, and became the first Millennium Organ Scholar at the Royal Hospital in Chelsea. As well as conducting, Michael is in demand as a pianist and organist, with regular appearances in Central London venues, especially at St. Martin in the Fields. He lives in Watford and is married with two young children.



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Jonathan Dods, Accompanist

Jonathan was a choral scholar at Christ Church, Oxford, where he studied music. He undertook further study at Milan Conservatoire whilst he was Assistant Organist at Lodi Cathedral.

Returning to England, Jonathan is in demand as an organist, singer and conductor. He assists the Director of Music at St Martin in the Fields directing choirs and playing the organ as well as singing in the professional chamber choir St Martin's Voices.

He broadcasts regularly on BBC radio and television. He is also Director of Music at St Michael and All Angels Bedford Park where he recently oversaw the installation of a new organ.

Concerts this month include Brahms *Requiem* at the Guard's Chapel, Liszt *Missa Choralis* at St Stephen Walbrook and the UK premiere of a Mass by Zelenka. His most unusual concert experience was singing with a choir at 11pm in a suburb of Vienna as part of Wien Modern. The piece involved making the noise of a helicopter and the concert ended with a punch-up between the composer and one of the singers.

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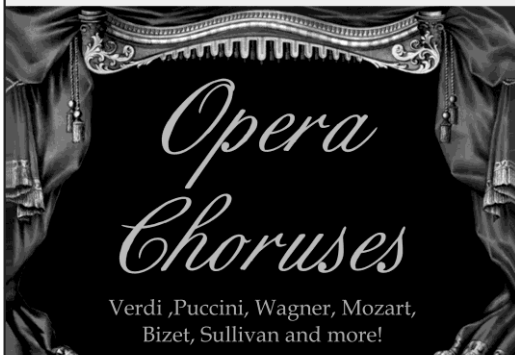
